MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Carers,

Yuma (hello).

Dhawura nguna dhawura Ngunnawal (This is Ngunnawal Country).

As we fly into Week 7 Namadgi School is gearing up for COVID safe end of year events, activities and student reports. Preschool are conducting information nights online and stay and play sessions for prospective families and I look forward to meeting our newest students over the coming weeks. We also have students entering Year 7 for 2021 and staff have been coordinating transition visits to ensure a smooth transition to Namadgi.

Over the last fortnight Namadgi staff have been involved in reviewing the school year to date through the National School Improvement Tool (NSIT). Using staff feedback, information collected from the 2020 Satisfaction Survey (parents, students and staff), alongside in-house school data the executive team have compiled a review that is informing how we plan for next year. I am currently in the process of putting this information together to create the 2021 annual plan and when complete it will be shared with the School Board and the greater community. With a great deal of interruption to the regular format due to COVID this process has been difficult but there are many positive things to celebrate as we move forward. Congratulations to Nicole and Chelsea who completed their Construction Certificate 2 training course this week with the Ginninderry Construction Group. They have successfully gained certification in brick laying, worksite safety and construction techniques. This course, along with our Industries Pathways Program, have been a great success in 2020 with students learning entry level trade skills towards future employment. Thank you to our staff who work tirelessly to coordinate these valuable study options for students.

The Preschool is currently undergoing a make-over. Throughout this week you will see Geoff Filmer from Graffik Paint designing and painting a new mural. It signifies the connections of families to Namadgi School and emulates indigenous story telling by creating pathways and connections to Namadgi. The colours are bold and look to pick up native tones and the animals represent the room mascots. The painting should be finished by Friday and we look forward to the splash of colour. In case you missed the No Assembly Friday post on Facebook last week we are working towards a Christmas Special. Weaving Workshop – By Archer and Freyja

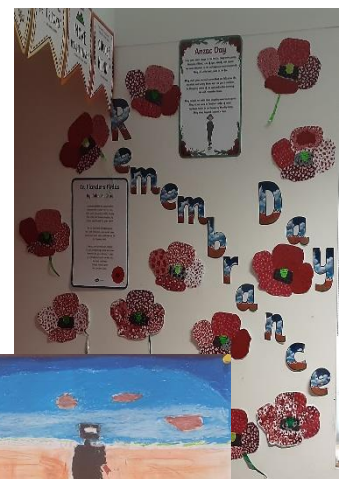

STEM

Term 4 has been a term of big questions in Science. Year 7 has been looking into why things like tides, eclipses, and seasons happen and their presentations on this have been superb. Year 8 turned their attention to the ground we walk on - exploring how rocks are made and how we can interpret the geological history of an area. At the moment, that area is a huge grid laid out in Ms Shevlin's classroom! Year 9 built on this topic, investigating how our current understanding of tectonic plates has developed over time. But perhaps our year 10s have posed the biggest question of all: how did our universe begin? Their essays on this and how we've learned what we now know were completed last week. After that, it's safe to say that year 10 is truly going out with a Big Bang!

What is the probability that all students from Year 7 to Year 10 will study Statistics, Term 4, 2020? The probability was 100%.

Yes, all classes from Year 7 to Year 10 have been studying Probability and Statistics throughout this term. Most students now know the height of themselves and some will know the height of their class mates. Other students will know the mean, median, mode and range for the number of pets and siblings in their class. The year 7 students were learning the basic vocabulary of Statistics while the Year 8 students have been learning to record the data in Frequency Tables and Year 9 students have been learning how to present data in histograms and stem and leaf plots. The year 10 were desperately trying to focus on Box and Whisker diagrams, while trying to decide the important things in their life. Such as what to wear to the formal and what make up will be considered too much or too little.

All in all, the students are learning that statistics tell stories and that you have to be able to read the data collected and presented to you as much as you need to collect and present data. Probability and Statistics seem easy but there is a lot to learn. Year 7 – 9 will be have their final tests in Statistics in week 8.

Financial maths and equation work will fill the last weeks of maths lessons, as students work on budgets and discounts for Christmas purchases and interest rates for their monetary gifts. We are all looking forward to a long summer break without any drama.

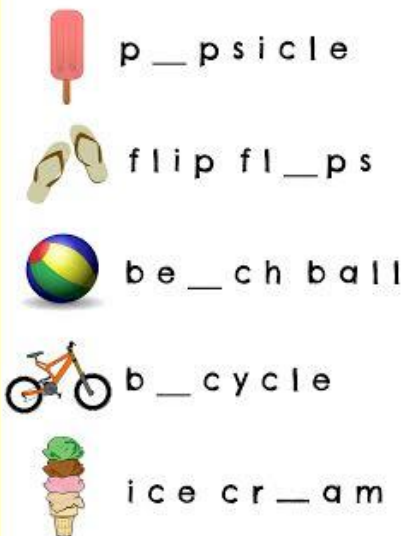
