
### Namadgí School Newsletter MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

### Kindergarten

In Kindergarten we have started learning letter names and the most common sound they make. On Monday mornings all of Kindy join together to participate in a 'mystery box'. In the mystery box there are items that start with the letter focus for that week. Below are some pictures of when we introduced the letter /m/ and the letter /a/. We discuss the items and make predictions for what we think the focus will be. Our Literacy blocks for the whole week are then centred around the new letter/sound. Students engage with a focus text during Readers Workshop where we pull out new words that start with the letter focus and identify new 'high frequency words'. We then base our writing around these words. Check out some of our amazing work!



In Mathematics we are continuing to build our number knowledge through our daily 'Number of the Day' experience. We are also working on matching numbers with their names and corresponding quantities.



Once again, we had winning produce with our cucumber, squash, zucchini and tomatoes coming in first place. We also won the Rosette ribbon.

#### **Student Identification Cards**



From the previous newsletter, you might recall their analysis of dirty water samples. Over the past three weeks, these budding scientists have diligently applied various separation techniques, resulting in the transformation of their water samples into clear, drinkable (potable) liquids. Congratulations to our Year 7's for their impressive efforts and commitment to scientific inquiry!



Meanwhile, in Mathematics, our Year 7 cohort has been immersing themselves in the study of integers. Understanding that integers encompass both positive and negative whole numbers, students have been actively honing their skills in adding and subtracting integers using visual aids such as number lines. Notably, they even constructed life-sized number lines outdoors to deepen their comprehension.

#### CREATIVE WRITING COMPETITION


All Namadgi students are encouraged to participate in the Term 1 Creative Writing Competition.

We have had a whirl wind start to the year within the English and Humanities faculty. We are having a strong push on literacy skills in both subjects. Our initial focus has been spelling for the first half of the term, to solidify a base with us now branching out into literacy skills including reading comprehension and literacy conventions.

We are also working on our school wide goal of improving student writing with a year-long focus of breaking down the writing process and explicitly teaching students how to write, including greater use of adjectives, adverbs and formulation of student opinion. As a part of this process, students will have noticed that there has been an increased use of workbooks within English and Humanities classrooms. The purpose of this is based in current research that has highlighted that there is significant growth and improvement in student writing and comprehension skills through the use of physical handwriting within the learning environment.
