
# Kindergarten








#### History



Starting from week 8, Year 3 classes have been very excited to engage in volleyball training with Gecko Sport once a week. Students who joined the lessons demonstrated wonderful sports skills and team spirit.









In weeks 8 and 9, we had staff from Mental Illness Education ACT (MIEACT) deliver a developed program called Thriving Minds Empowered Futures. This program is designed to improve emotional literacy and help-seeking for emotional distress in Year 3 and 4 students. Students engaged well in the lessons, gaining a deeper understanding of their emotions, and learning useful strategies to calm down.









On Harmony Day, 3JG celebrated the cultural differences that make us stronger as a community. We utilized Harmony Day learning resources to reflect on the many cultures experienced within Australia. Students created a connecting display to list their favourite things and their origins from around the world. I'm not so sure why they are here. they came to attack our land and turn us into slaves. We have to clean sheets and blankets and do washing to get food.



### KITCHEN GARDEN NEWS

Students have been busy in the kitchen enjoying making some sweeter food items, and banana and strawberry smoothies. Students in K – 2 made and decorated easter biscuits and students in 3 – 6 decorated apples slices (apple eggs). In the classroom, students in year 3 have been learning about various plant and insect lifecycles, and they continue to carefully observe our citrus tree caterpillars in the observatory tank. Year 4 have been learning about contaminated waterways and the impacts of various habitats. Their investigations allow them to understand how easily contaminates travel and the associated climate impacts. Year 5-6 students have been learning out microorganisms and they were shocked by the results of their investigation of growing microbes on bread!





#### Sustainability in the classroom





Did you know 10% of global greenhouse gases comes from uneaten food and in Australia alone we waste 7.6 million tonnes of food each year. Food waste can cost households over \$2000 per year (facts from Oz Harvest https://www.ozharvest.org/). Each classroom in the primary school has a paper bin, rubbish bin, 10c recycling bin and a compost bin. This allows for our students to be active waste warriors observing and learning about sustainability and environmental impacts. Students also have an opportunity to participate in a weekly Eco Warriors program allowing them to dispose of the waste correctly and safely. The compost bins are emptied into the Kitchen Gardens compost bins, which then goes into the worm farms leading to our nutritious garden soil. Over the last few weeks students have been weighing the classroom compost waste. Each K-6 classroom has on average 1.5 -2kg of food waste per week, with all K-6 classes contributing approximately 30kg of food waste per week. This prevents the waste going into landfill and resulting in dangerous methane gases. Unfortunately, a lot of the food thrown out is perfectly edible, this is mostly fruit (whole apples and bananas) and bread (whole sandwiches and bread crust).

#### Green tips

- 1. Encourage and support your child to be a part of the shopping, cooking, and lunch packing process this may prevent food waste and in turn save money.
- 2. Cutting up fruit into bit size pieces and using different shapes/cuts may make the eating easier, quicker, and more enjoyable for some children.
- 3. Checking the fridge and pantry prior to shopping and writing a shopping list may help to avoid over purchasing and it also saves time. Look at what foods needs to be used first and find recipes that use these ingredients.
- 4. Save time by cooking in bulk and freeze for later use. A large batch of muffins, banana bread, pastries etc. can be frozen and taken out in the morning and placed in the lunch box (defrosting in time for eating time)
- 5. The Oz Harvest website has loads of information, tips, and recipes to support your household to fight food waste!


### Year 7 travels to the National Museum of Australia.







